Wigwam

1738 January 12 (Thursday). I rode to visit the Indians, Old David, etc., at their Wigwam.

1746 December 29 (Monday). Din'd with Mrs. Beamans after which Abimaleck (Indian) his Daughter Deborah having a Child Dead in their Wigwam and having desir'd Mr. Jonah Warrin to Send for me, I went to them, pray'd in the Wigwam and went to the Grave. I gave them Severe Admonitions and Earnest Exhortations.

1754 January 15 (Tuesday). I was at Eve reckoning with Mr. Ebenezer Rice at his House while Daniel Williams and his Squaw, who are come from Dudley to wigwam among us, came, at my sending for, to See me, but I saw them not.

1764 October 22 (Monday). [Sandwich] Mr. Williams and I ride to the Indian Town, Mashpee. N.B. On the Way, a Rock called Non-such, wherein is a Print, which they call the Devils cloven foot. It is in this form, [here a sketch of a cloven foot]. Mr. Hawley, the Minister, went with me to See some of the Wigwams. Went into the Wigwam of Mary, the Widow of Popmonet, formerly Sachem. Dined at Mr. Hawley's.

1770 July 30 (Monday). Visit at Mr. Samuel Fays -- at the Wigwam of Mohegin Indians. At Mr. Edwards Whipples.

1771 December 5 (Thursday). *Samuel Asbo* and his Squa here, and they with the rest of his Friends make a Wigwam in the Swamp that is near us. He says he is son of the Minister of the Same Name at *Mohegin*. I

1772 March 3 (Tuesday). Mr. Taylor at Eve here. Brings the British Grammar; and Several Pamphlets: his Letter also from Mr. Crosby at Ono'quage. Mr. Taylor etc. go to *Ashbo's* Wigwam.

1772 April 1 (Wednesday). P.M. *Deacon Wood* and his Wife, Children and Maid, having been to See the Indians at the Wigwam, come here.

1772 April 6 (Monday). In the Morning the Snow froze so as to bear, I accompanyed my Wife and Kinsman Bradshaw, to *Ashbo's* wigwam.

1772 June 10 (Wednesday). *John Chowin*, an Indian, or rather Molatto, here, and acquaints me with the Death of his infant Child and desires I would be the Funeral of it tomorrow.

1772 June 11 (Thursday). Rode to John *Chowin's* Wigwam; prayed there and attended the burying the Child.
